## Construction/Reconstruction brought changes throughout the world

ing five gold ones. The next winter olympics will be held in 1994 at Norway.

Bland students received first-hand information on foreign lands from the two exchange students, Danielle Garcia of Brazil and Giselle Aries of Panama.
