The boys have a grand total of 105 enterprises, which is an average of about four projects per member.

Last year the Ceres F. F. A. boys completed a total of 76 projects with 23.8 acres of crops, 76 animals, 1120 fouls and had a total of 72 supplementary farm jobs.

The 76 projects had total expenses of $\$ 2,513.85$ and total credits of $\$ 3,420.14$. They made a profit of $\$ 1,629.00$ had a total labor income of $\$ 1487.59$. They had spent 4018 self hours with labor income of $\$ 59.50$ an average of 192 hours per boy.
